Rick McGee returned to the Grand Theatre in Fitzgerald, GA, where he had spent time helping to ready the Barton for its premiere appearance, having constructed the stoprails for the instrument. The February visit was not a technical one, but full of technique – performance technique – as he appeared in

concert on the organ that he helped to build.

Rick opened with his favorite "Great Day" after Lyn Larsen, then Vera Lynn put in an appearance through "Be Like the Kettle and Sing." "Shangri-La" was his tribute to Bob Van Camp, and then it was the music of Cole Porter, Rachmaninoff, Robert Flack, Leonard Bernstein (West Side Story) - could there be a more diverse program than

this? He then offered a tribute to Star-Crossed Lovers and after a nod to Jesse with "I'm Confessin'," he concluded with Hector Olivera's "Suzette."

The well-received program concluded the Grand's first season of organ presentations with music by one of the people who helped start it at the renovation phase. We look forward to next season!

## ***Heartstrings for Hope 2012***

Normally, most of those of us who play don't write about ourselves, but this event was such a success – and not because of me – that I think it deserves reporting.

As most of you know, a group of members from our chapter keep Chattanooga's Tivoli Theatre Wurlitzer playing, led by Larry Donaldson of Alabama and Bert Allee of Manchester, TN.

Last year, I approached Brian Stewart from US101 (WUSY), Chattanooga's powerhouse country music station, about opening their annual country music concert with classic country music on the theatre organ. The concert is an event that is a highly successful fundraiser for St. Jude's Children's Hospital. Brian and his associates agreed and so last year, the organ was used for the first time to "play in the house," and I wrote about it at the time.

In January, Brian contacted all the stakeholders to inquire if they wanted to use the organ again this year and they unanimously and enthusiastically expressed their desire to have us back, so on March 6, Bert and Ann Allee and I arrived at the theatre and set up the organ. This year, the organ was considerably upstage from where it was positioned last year – they wanted it to show up better in the photos. Brian told me that the theatre opened at 6 pm and the show started at 7 pm and said, "Do you have an hour of music in you?" Ha!

So for that hour I used music from as far back as the Carter Family and Merle Travis up to Tammy Wynette and including Johnny Cash, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Patsy Cline, Roy Acuff and many others. The organ was well-received by the sold-out crowd and I was greeted in the lobby by those who recognized me and suggested more songs for next year.

After the program, Brian told me, "As long as I'm here, you have a part in our program, and thanks," and the folks from St. Jude's expressed their thanks to the Atlanta Chapter, American Theatre Organ Society to the crowd.

And all this for children. It doesn't get any better.

The event — a screening of the German silent film 'Pandora's Box.' The Artist — our own Ron Carter!

This was a ticketed event,

serving as a joint fund-raiser between the Callanwolde Fine Arts Center and the Atlanta Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society.

Managing Director Sam Goldman greeted the near hundred attendees and offered a short history of the mansion and its current mission. Then he introduced our accompanist, Ron Carter, and Ron offered us the back-story of the film and historical and trivia-related information.

This film is the story of Lulu, a young and raw seductress, dashing through the lives of suitors who fall victim "like a moth to her flame!!"

The instrument (orchestra) used for the soundtrack was the 60-rank Aeolian Grand Pipe Organ. The console is located in the Great Hall, some of the chambers above the foyer entry, some above the grand staircase,

and the Echo division in the Winter Room – truly "surround-sound!"

Self-guided tours of the mansion were allowed for any who wanted to tour the house.

A rousing applause was offered the artist for his full and stirring score to this film of great dramatic intensity – well deserved !!!

Biz E. Body was hiding in the walls and roaming the halls, and just happened to be present at this event. Better watch out – I may be coming to your location without notice !!!!

- From Atlanta, take I-85 south.
- Take Exit 51 (GA-154) and turn right onto Sharpsburg McCollum Road (GA-154).
- Go about 0.6 mile and cross the railroad crossing.
- Turn left onto US-29/GA-14 at the traffic light.
- Go about 7.3 miles and turn right (West) onto Phillips Street, which is about 0.3 mile past the 3rd traffic light after turning left onto US-29. It is slightly hard to see on the right.
- Phillips Street becomes Sherwood Drive (about 0.2 mile) at the traffic light.
- At the fork, stay to the right.
- The street winds around and 18 Sherwood is a tan stucco house on the right.

Park anywhere before you get in front of the house. It is on a curve that is not a good place to park directly in front of the house. Driveway of the house will be open for parking for those who have trouble walking.
