

Richard Hills Plays the Grande Page, Stephenson High School March 5, Saturday, 7:30 pm

As The Song Goes, So What's New?

When the Stephenson High School Page Organ Crew was working feverishly to get the organ ready for the 2013 ATOS Annual Convention, they left us an organ that played 15 of the 22 ranks planned for the installation. These ranks included:

- MAIN: Concert Flute, Diapason, Main String, Main Tibia, Main Vox Humana, Clarinet, Tuba, Quintadena
- SOLO: Solo Tibia, Solo String, Kinura, Orchestral Oboe, Saxophone, French Horn, Post Horn



It was a glorious sound, but it was “rough” and tonally, had a lot of holes in it. What has been added has given the organ a lush, rich sound because most of what was added – except for the Trumpet – was lush, ensemble sounds, including:

- Main String and Solo String

celestes (a celeste is an identical set of pipes, slightly tuned sharp which gives the strings their “shimmer”).

Thus, the Page has four sets of glorious strings...plus

- Quintadena – a rather “edgy” flute sound – the pipes have been refurbished and recapped.
- Dulciana and Unda Maris – these are gorgeous, soft strings – the quietest stops
- The Solo Vox Humana
- The original Page Clarabella Flute has been returned to the organ in place of the replacement Wurlitzer Concert Flute.

Now he returns, this time to play our chapter’s own Grande Page pipe organ that has just undergone tonal finishing under the unparalleled hands of Clark Wilson and Carlton Smith. Appropriate that they are unparalleled for so is Richard Hills and so will be this coming concert.

Some months ago, I wrote about the board of directors who come together to run the chapter so that our meetings are free for entertainment and not business.

This month, I will recognize two people who were instrumental in the success of the recent tonal finishing of the Page Organ. No, not Clark and Carlton, we know how much we owe them, and they’ve been publicly honored. But there were two people who worked very long hours and in the background while C&C were here to make things happen that needed to happen.

One of them needs no introduction for if there is a chapter member who has been indispensable over the years, it is **John Tanner**. With three or four organ jobs at the organ shop having to be dealt with, traveling from Atlanta to Columbus – OH, not GA – to south Georgia to Beaufort, SC and who knows where else, he worked nights and weekends on regulators, tremis, chests, supervising a too-small crew and got more accomplished than seemed possible. During

the visit of The Two, he installed a chest, got it winded, removed and reinstalled a trem, shortened other lines – and that was just in the daytime. At night he was busy in the shop with regulators, tremis, pipes, and I don’t know what else.

The other person was **John Alford**. How many times during the week did I hear the words, “Where’s Johnny,” or “Find Johnny.” Whether it was checking driver boards, to assisting with cleaning pipes to running to the store for supplies to driving to Tennessee to bring back a couple of ranks of pipes, he was busy and working late nights with JT. Since he and Carlton had been friends for years, Carlton – as geniuses often do – became focused on what he was doing and like a great surgeon just expected things to flow around him as he worked. And Johnny was his man. And whenever the call came, day or night, he was there. And where did we ever find a Gottfried Trumpet? You guessed it.

There have been many, many people who have contributed countless hours to the Page and there will be a time to chronicle these contributions and honor the contributors, but when you hear the Grande Page and the work done by Carlton and Clark, you can add John Tanner and John Alford to the names of those who made it happen that week.

- The Oboe Horn – less strident than its Orchestral Oboe counterpart and perfect in the accompaniment...
- and, the French Trumpet.

With the tonal finishing accomplished by Clark Wilson and Carlton Smith, each rank now has each pipe speaking properly in volume and tone; and each rank is in proper balance with the others, “terraced” correctly so that the Flute is in proper proportion in volume to the Clarinet, which is

proper to the Tuba, etc., etc.

The organ layout by chamber is:

- MAIN- Tibia, String, String Celeste, Clarabella Flute, Diapason, Quintadena, Oboe Horn, Tuba, Clarinet, Vox Humana, Dulciana, Unda Maris
- SOLO – Tibia, String, String Celeste, Post Horn, Trumpet, French Horn, Kinura, Orchestral Oboe, Vox Humana, Saxophone

Just about half the organ is made up of ranks original to the

Page organ. And the Flute, one Tibia, the Diapason, the Tuba, one String, the French Horn and the Post Horn all extend down to the 16’ pitch, giving the organ a powerful bass!

The sound today is spectacular, glorious, and everything we had dreamed of creating in the Grande Page’s new home. And Richard Hills is sure to make it sound even better, because that is what our greatest players do. You do not want to miss Saturday night, March 5th.

There are some who will read this who do not know who Richard is and wonder what the excitement is about. From the Cinema Organ Society, we read these words: “Richard Hills is one of the very few musicians to have truly bridged and mastered the divide between the world of the classical organ and that of the theatre organ. Having commenced classical organ studies under William Whitehead at Rochester Cathedral, he became Organ Scholar at Exeter College Oxford, studying with David Sanger. Further organ scholarships followed at Portsmouth Cathedral where he studied with

Rosemary Field, and at Westminster Abbey. He now pursues a freelance career and is Organist at St Mary's, Bourne Street, London. His career in the theatre organ world has been equally prestigious. He has numerous prizes and awards to his credit, both in this country and in the USA, where he was named 'Organist of the Year' in 2010 by the American Theatre Organ Society. He has appeared many times on national and international TV and Radio, including solo appearances on programs as diverse as Radio 3 Choral Evensong and Radio 2's 'Friday Night is Music Night', and has several recording credits.”

What is missing from the COS

biography is that he was awarded first place honors in the Young Organist Competition at the age of 14, that the next convention stunned the entire theatre organ world with an amazing concert, and that every concert since then has provided memories that are talked about years later by those who were in attendance.

It will be our good fortune on March 5 at 7:30 pm to hear our own treasured organ in the hands of a treasure of the theatre organ world – a delightful young man, an incomparable performer, who will provide us with another unforgettable experience!

So, if you, a friend, and another couple wish to come – you can buy two for \$30 but get \$60 worth of tickets! The


only thing we ask is this: use those free tickets to introduce someone to the Page organ.

It took four years and 4 million dollars to make which is equivalent to 20 million in today's dollars! Starring Ramon Novarro and Francis X. Bushman the film is based on the novel which had sold more copies in its time than any other except the Bible and was blessed by the Pope. Now, more than seventy five years after its blaze into film history, the grandeur of this film and its famed blunders cannot fail to excite our awe and curiosity. The famous chariot race was not topped in the 1959 version. Instead it was copied!! Forty-two cameramen logged 53,000 feet of film on race day with thousands of extras!
